April Runway Closures

• RWY 10R/28L:

- 4/4: Closed 8:00am 9:00am, Routine Maintenance
- 4/18: Closed 8:00am 9:00am, Routine Maintenance
- 4/25: Closed 8:00am 9:00am, Routine Maintenance

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Parking Garage Construction Updates

East Public Garage

- Tower crane erected 4/30
- Pedestrian bridge girders formwork and rebar placement in progress.
- Construction of main stair tower in progress and rebar is being placed for concrete walls.
- Parking garage office's exterior rigid insulation is being installed.

Employee Garage

Forms and rebar placed for Micropile caps.



Taxilane Sierra

Taxilane S Widening and New Cargo Apron

- Embankment of material continues for the new cargo apron.
- Preparation of the subbase for Phase 1 is ongoing.
- Jacking and boring of a storm sewer pipe under Taxilane S is complete.







West Cargo VALE eGSE

West Cargo Voluntary Airport Low Emissions Ground Support Equipment

- Installing underground power to the west cargo apron's aircraft hardstands, eliminating the need for aircraft to continue running their engine or use the existing diesel GPUs.
- Construction started April 25.
- Directional boring and pulling electrical conduits is in process.
- Electrical vaults will be placed in early May.







Masks Now Optional in Airport

- A court ruling voided the federal mask mandate for public transportation.
- TSA announced on April 18th they will no longer enforce its Security Directives and Emergency Amendment requiring mask use.
- Masks are now optional in the Boise Airport—and as a city facility, we will look to the City of Boise for any further guidance regarding masking.



Parking Update

- The Boise Airport saw two weekends in April that outpaced this year's spring break parking demand.
- To accommodate this steady demand for public parking, employees will be relocated from the Economy Lot.
- Relocated employees will park in the Elder St. Lot (rented lot) and Lot 20 through Labor Day, after which the airport will reassess needs.



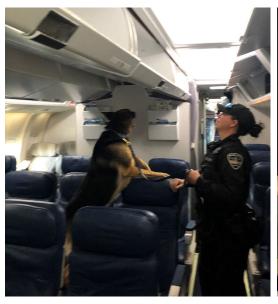
2022 Triennial Emergency Exercise

 - Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS)

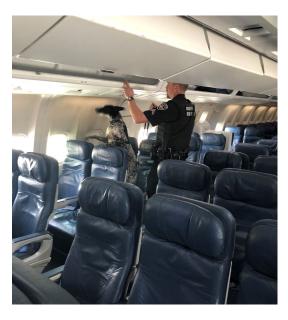


Annual BOI K9 Evaluations

- Public will be invited to attend the open house via a notice in the newspaper, postcards to select zip codes, email to stakeholders, and through the airport's social channels and website.

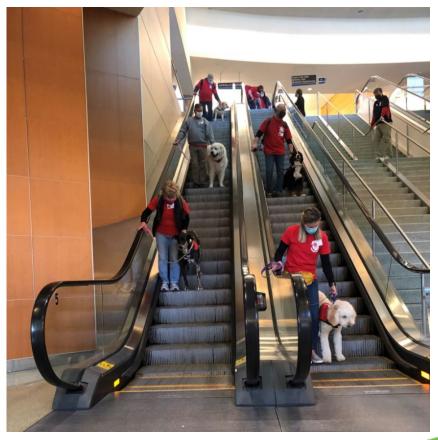


GoTeam Therapy Dog Training

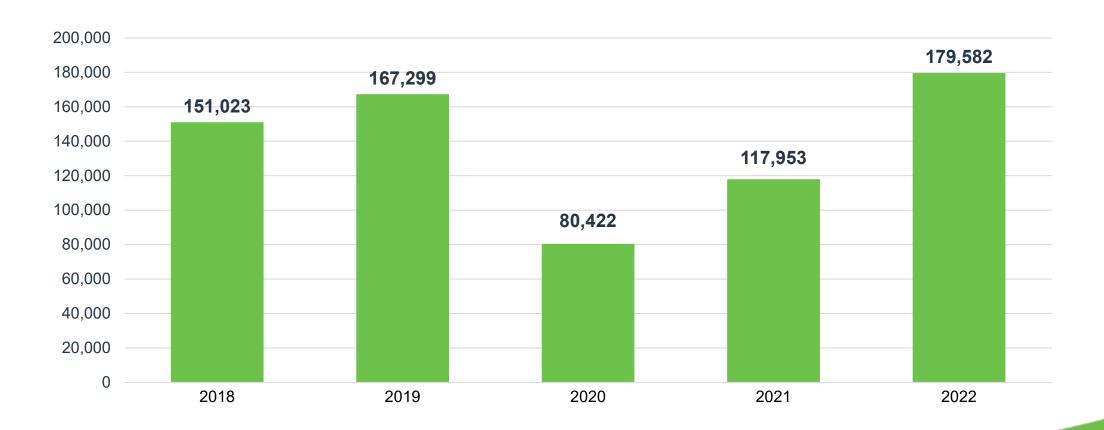




Airfield Maintenance, Ops and Facilities Maintenance celebrated the end of winter (and the end of snow clearing) with a catered lunch.

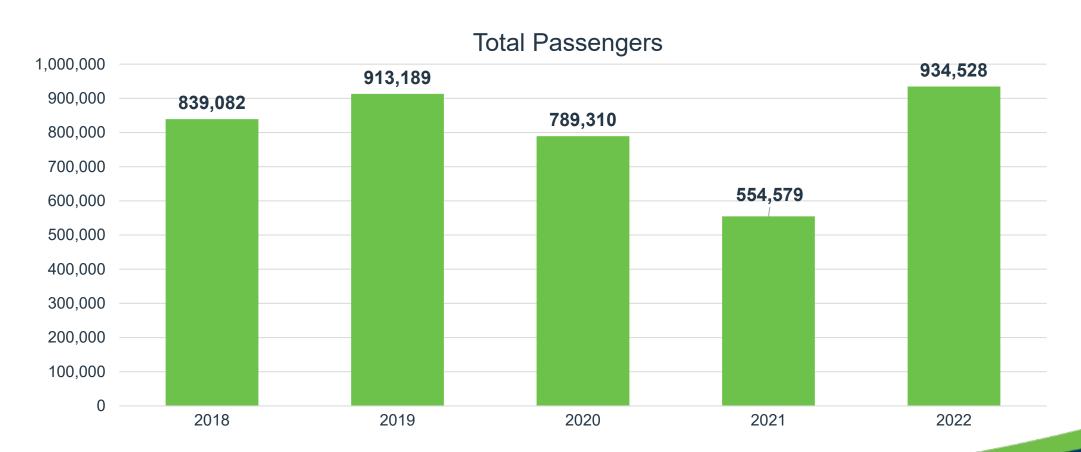
March Enplanements

2022 Total Passengers (through March)

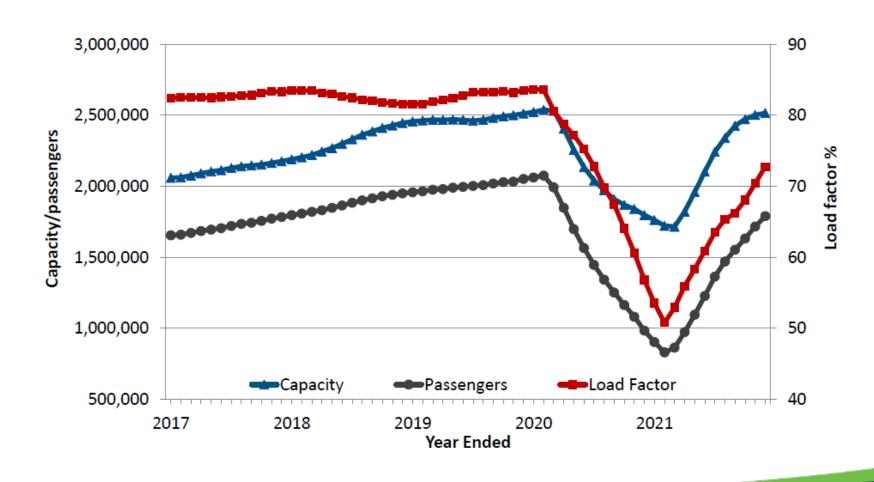
Up 2% over 2019 | Up 69% over 2021

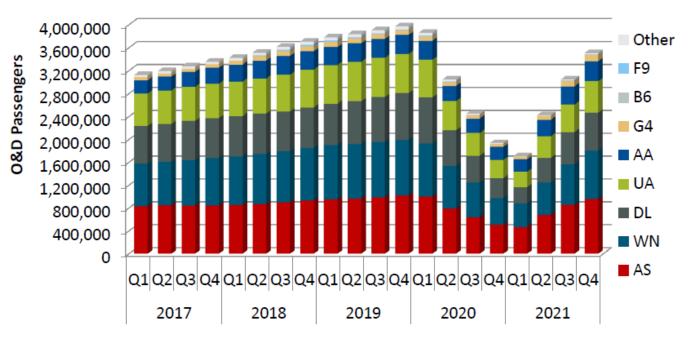

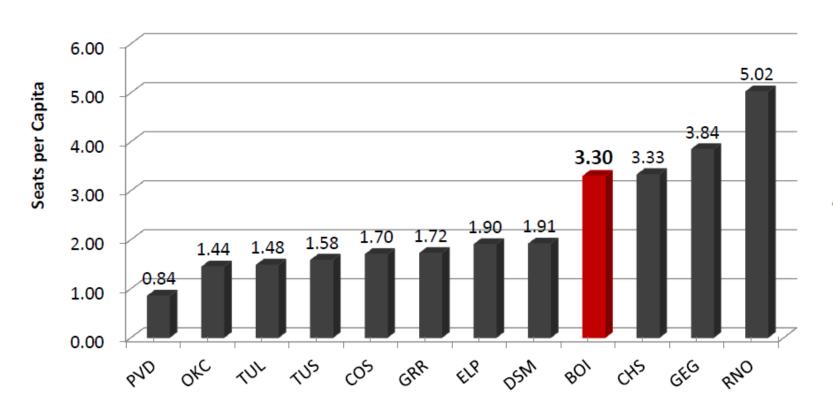
Boise Forward Looking Schedule

Seats Per Capita Comparison

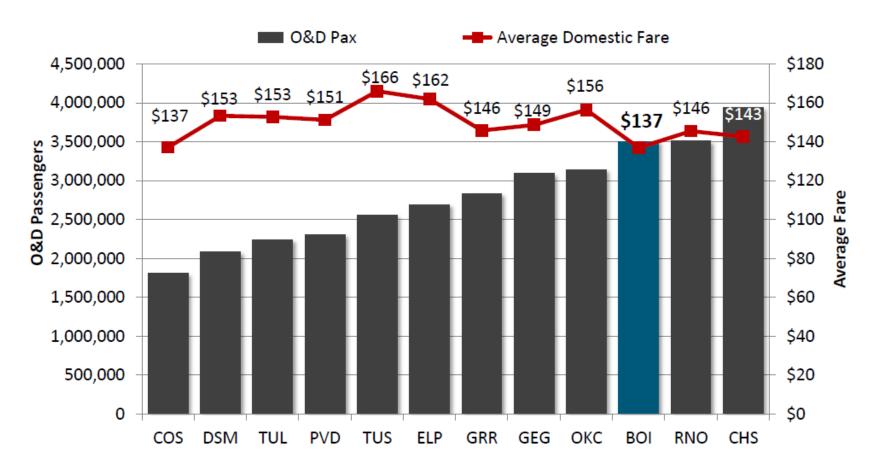


Boise exceeds all comparison markets except Charleston, Spokane and Reno in seats per capita.
