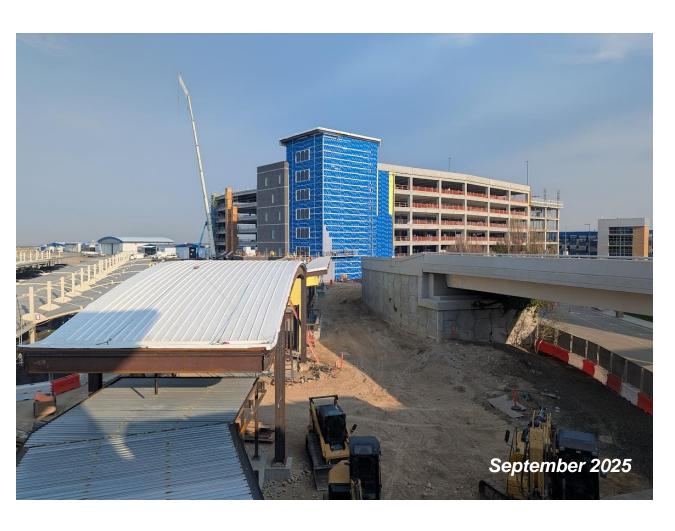

Runway Closure



- Runway 10L/28R has been closed since April due to construction of the Concourse A Apron.
 - Anticipated reopening date is mid-October.
- No other closures to report in August.

Consolidated Rent-A-Car Center (ConRAC)



- Metal siding installation has begun.
- Inside the Customer Service Building:
 - Elevator install has begun.
 - Rough-in for mechanical, electrical and plumbing is nearly complete.
- Ramps are complete through level 6
- Construction of employee walkway is underway.

Concourse Development and Terminal Improvements Program Update

Construction Manager/General Contractor:

- Contract approved by City Council 8/19
- Issued NTP#1 on 9/2 for Pre-construction Services
 - Mobilization, cost estimating, process development

Architect/Engineering:

- Schematic Design (Concourse A, Baggage System, Central Utility Plant, Terminal Improvements) began 8/19
- First workshop: 8-10 September

Next Steps:

- Develop RACI (Responsible, Accountable, Consult, Inform) Matrix
- Risk Register: Identify top risks & mitigation strategies
- PDS engagement



Concourse A Apron – Phase 1B



- Installed stormwater pipe, stormwater structures and apron underdrain pipe.
- Importing and placement of P-154 sub-base and P-209 base course material.
- Preparing for the PCC P-501 concrete paving slated early September.

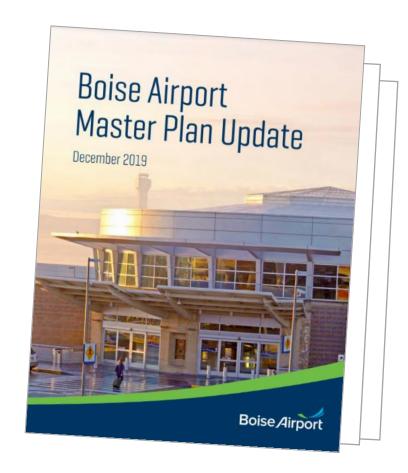
Airport Way Drainage Work

- News release will go out later this week to notify the community prior to work starting.

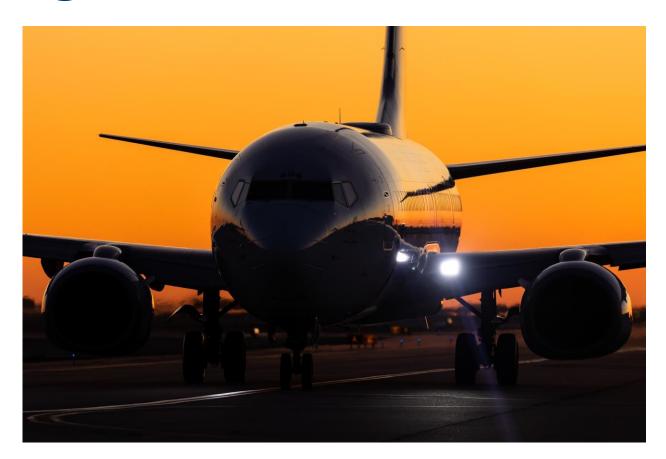
Master Plan Update

- Master Plan information and schedule are now available on the airport's website: https://www.iflyboise.com/about-boi/masterplan/
- Currently in the investigation phase, which includes inventory of existing conditions, defining environmental baselines, aviation forecasting for FAA approval and ground surveys.
- The Master Plan will guide airside and landside facility development for the next 20 years.



Airline Use and Lease Agreement Extension

- BOI and airline partners have agreed to a one-year extension on the current Airline Use and Lease Agreement (AULA), starting October 1.
- With this extension, the airlines have approved funding for the design (pre-construction work) associated with Concourse A and its associated projects.
- Approval for funding terminal roof repairs was also granted.



Successful Triennial Exercise

- Thank you to everyone who had a role in the TriEx in August!
- Special recognition for Mike Crane, Jodi Spencer, Matt Cooper and Thomas Anderson!
- Multi-jurisdictional, real-world drill that simulates a major incident to test and evaluate the airport's emergency plan and readiness.
- Required by the FAA every three years.



Spirit Airlines Bankruptcy



- Spirit filed for bankruptcy protection on Friday, 8/29 for the second time in a year.
- As part of its restructuring, the airline said it would reduce its presence in certain markets, including BOI.
- Spirit will exit BOI on October 4th. Passengers booked after that date will receive a refund from the airline.
- Spirit operated a single route from Boise to Las Vegas, a destination that is also served by Southwest and Alaska.

- Facilities Maintenance Group has a new tier system for employee advancement that is based on tenure, training hours and signed-off checklists from the trades.

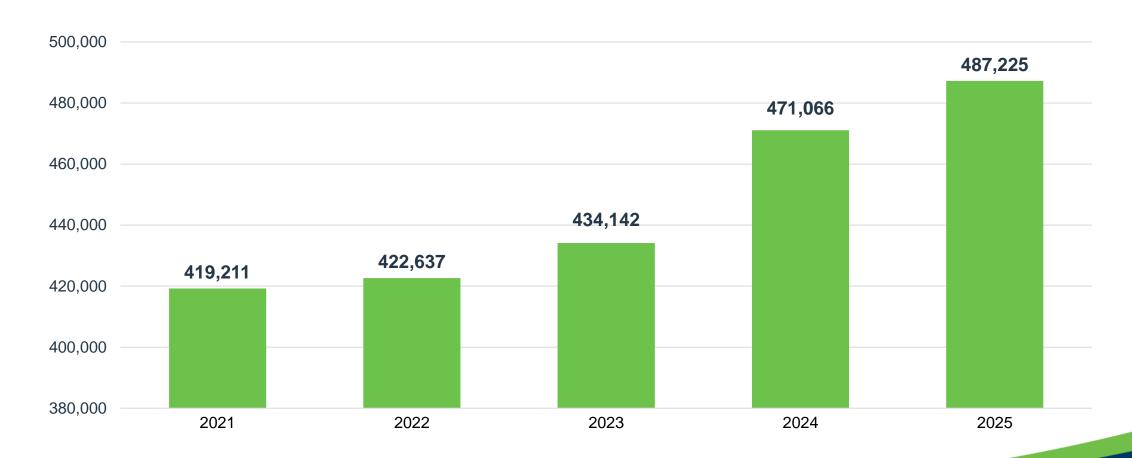

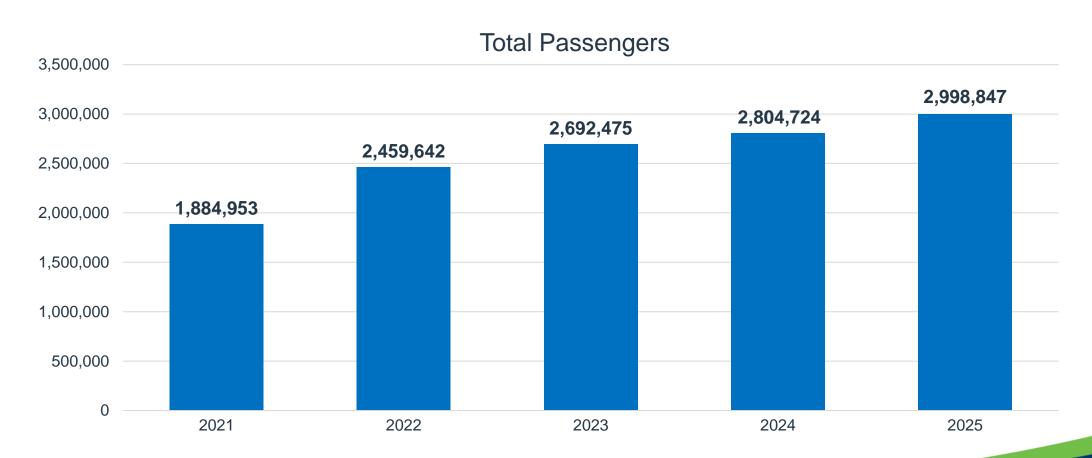
July Enplanements

Passenger Facility Charges

Given by Kathleen Watkins, Deputy Director of Finance and Business Development

Overview

- Established in 1990 over concerns that existing funding sources for airport development were insufficient.
- The original legislation permitted airports to charge a Passenger Facility Charge (PFC) in \$1 increments up to \$3.
- The Wendell H. Ford Aviation Investment and Reform Act for 21st Century (AIR-21) increased the charge to \$4.50 in 2000.
- PFC eligibility criteria:
 - Preserve or enhance capacity, safety, or security
 - Reduce noise or mitigate noise impacts
 - Enhance competition
- Imposition of a PFC at any level is granted by the FAA via an application.
- Submitted applications either "streamlined" or "traditional."

Passenger Facility Charge Benefits

PFCs are a *local* funding source (not a federally imposed tax)

Eligibility is
expanded beyond
AIP Grant
eligibility,
especially for
terminal projects

Can be *leveraged to*pay debt service

and make long-term

Not subject to certain AIP Grant procurement rules

PFC Payments

PFCs are collected per eligible passenger per segment.

- Excludes flight crews and passengers who are traveling on:
 - Frequent flyer award tickets
 - Multi-segment connecting flights (max 2 boardings for one-way or 4 round-trip)
 - Essential Air Service (EAS) routes
 - Some carriers providing nonscheduled service

Air carriers remit PFCs to airports monthly.

Air carriers are compensated \$0.11 of each PFC collected for collecting, handling and remitting PFC revenue.



PFCs and AIP Grants

The foundation for PFC eligibility is AIP

Rule of Thumb: "If it is AIP-eligible, it is PFC-eligible"
